We have all purchased those wonderful pre-cut packs of fabrics: 10" squares, 5" squares, and 2 1/2" strip sets. These packets provide a variety of fabrics without having to purchase multiple yardage. Colleen Granger will show you how you can make several of her designs using these packets. She will also show you different settings that are sure to get your creative juices flowing as well as how to make her "drunkin border."

Colleen Granger was raised in the San Francisco Bay Area and joined the Air Force shortly after her high school graduation. She served

as a helicopter mechanic for seven years before leaving to have her second child. Colleen has spent the majority of her life in Alaska, making her home in Glennallen.

She went kicking and screaming into the world of quilting in the summer of 1998. Until that time, Colleen had been a sewer and thought quilting was a waste of good fabric. But she caught the bug big-time and purchased her long-arm quilting machine just eight months after making her first quilt.

Colleen is a grandmother, mother, widow, sister and daughter. She has enjoyed living part-time, in Alaska. She has been an instructor at the International Quilt Festivals in Houston, Texas, and Chicago, Illinois. She enjoys what she does and believes that "if you are not having fun, then you shouldn't be doing 'it' whatever 'it' may be."

An avid sewer all her life, Linda Ballard has taken her skills from dressmaking to creating wonderful traditional quilts using today's faster techniques and tools. She believes there's always something for everyone when it comes to quilting, and that quilters have a strong bond unlike anything else.

She lives outside Redding in a country community called Palo Cedro. Linda was a quilt shop owner in Redding and now travels throughout the country teaching both on land and sea.

Linda is known for her quilting retreats, her teachings and has been featured in a variety of quilting magazines with her quilts, her patterns and as "ad" quilts for a specific line of fabrics. Linda will tell you constantly "to be flexible and go with the possibilities that are presented." She always finishes with one simple word: Enjoy!

"What if I" Are you one who follows the rules? Do you change out your fabric values, play with the components or create different borders? We'll explore how subtle changes can give you an entirely new quilt. You'll see a whole new world after this program. The program consists of a short power point section along with quilts that only reinforces the 'What If I."

Margaret Fabrizo: 'Going to the Source' Aug. 17, 7 p.m.

Margaret Fabrizo studied quilt making with Grace Earl, designer at the Chicago Art Institute, and her prize-winning quilts have been exhibited in Northern California and at New Pieces Gallery in Berkeley, where she also played a forte-piano concert.

Her brother, grandmother and sister have all made quilts. Although she has always sewn, she came to quilting only in the last 10 years when she began making quilts for herself and her family. Each piece is machine-pieced and hand-quilted. Most have their origin in traditional design but develop organically, influenced very much by the personality of the recipient. She starts and finishes a queen-size quilt in 6 to 12 weeks, working night and day. The process takes over her life until the last stitch is taken. She finds quilting not unlike music. She is completely caught up in the initial concept, mesmerized by color and texture, absorbed by the rhythm of the repeating patterns.



As a 4-year-old, **Nancie Bennett** loved playing with her great-grandmother's thimbles. Her grandmother taught Nancie to sew on her treadle machine. In 1974, Nancie began quilting. Quilting was put on hold while she raised her children. In 1986, Nancie started a quilting business, Quilting for a Small Planet, which she still has today. She makes baby and children's quilts. The proceeds support Marine Wild Life. Nancie specializes in appliqué. She and her husband retired eight years ago. They have six grandchildren now so it seems there will be many more quilts for her to sew.

Rosalie Wilson, a native San Franciscan, learned to sew in middle school. She was hooked. Rose and her husband have three children and four grandchildren. Years ago she enrolled in a beginning quilting class at Black Cat Quilts in San Francisco. She still has the quilt she made in that class. The ever-talented Rose also taught knitting at the senior center. There she met Neva Hernandez who introduced her to Peninsula Quilters. Over the years Rose has made many, many quilts for her family and for charity. She also sewed at Bethel Lutheran Church where items were made to sell to benefit the disabled. Rose likes all quilting but her heart is in applique.



Member Spotlight: Rita Leung



Our guild "Blaster" was born in Oakland, grew up in San Francisco and graduated from Lowell High School, attended City College and then finished her education and graduated from University of California, Berkeley, and now lives in Redwood City. She's a California girl who had a short sojourn in New York. Her siblings, her two children, their spouses, and her adored granddaughters all live close. Only her husband started his life in China but has wisely become a Californian.

The California girl began quilting twice. In the 1980s, she made a template, stacked four layers of fabric, used scissors to cut around the template, noticed the pieces had raggedy edges and weren't quite the same size. Everything was tossed. In the late '90s, she realized she should prepare for the empty nest that would soon be hers and Albert's. This time she took two classes for beginners. She learned how to do simple paper piecing and simple appliqué, to hand

piece, make templates, and use a rotary cutter. After that, she said "nothing scared me. I could do what I wanted to do."

Rita has wanted to do a lot and she has. She consistently makes quilts for charity. When she first retired, she made a neo-natal quilt a week. The last few years, she has made 30 to 60 baby quilts a year, most of which are given to an orphanage her church built in the Congo. She also makes and gives many to the guild and those that are sizes LifeMoves doesn't accept she gives to the Soldiers Network. She belongs to Saturday Stitchers, a bee that tries to make one quilt and one baby quilt a year for charity. Of course, she also makes many bed-size quilts for herself, her family and friends. She claims the purchase of a long-arm (and a husband who loves to tinker with machines) is what allows her to be so prolific.

When her granddaughters arrived, Rita knew she wanted to make each of them an I-Spy quilt, so she started collecting novelty fabric, which she loves. She just kept collecting it. Then after about six years, she realized she needed tone-on-tone fabric to put them together. She started the first one a couple of years ago, and she is still feeding her addiction to buying novelty prints.

She says Donna Allard, an amazingly prolific former member of the guild, was her inspiration. Rita tries to follow Donna's example of using all of her fabric: Make a quilt, then use the leftover fabric for a smaller quilt, and so on. Watch Rita at a meeting or casual gathering and you will see another Donna Allard trait. Rita is always sewing. That's why she accomplishes more than most of us.
